Meeting Notes:

• Daniel Bierschwale

- Kicked off meeting
- Summary of the purpose of the group
- Asked coordinators for a brief update from each coordinator on their organization and an update on strategies each coordinator is responsible for

Economic Development (Update provided by Taylor Rose)

- No coordinator present, seat will be filled when Chamber/VBS hires new CEO
- o Taylor Rose offered to get further updates from Scott Johnson
- O Update on the hiring of the CEO; a search firm has been engaged
- COVID-19 update: Chamber/VBS has done a great job being proactive during the last year by providing resources to local businesses

Public Works (Update provided by Daniel Bierschwale)

- Passing of 1% for Infrastructure was a major win for the community
- o Canyon Water & Sewer District has been formed
 - Additional update from Kristin Gardner:
 - Formed at end of December
 - Currently electing a board and establishing governance structure
- o Ciara Wolfe mentioned the need for a trash transfer station and community recycling facilities

Transportation (Update provided by David Kack)

- o Bus barn in Big Sky slated to be ready by fall, plan to share space with the School District
- May 4th Ballot will have item to expand BSTD boundaries to match BSRAD boundaries → Need help asking voters to vote yes
- TIGER Grant Update:
 - Phasing will be left up to contractor who will be selected this spring

- This summer left turn lane for north bound 191 traffic onto Lone Mountain Trail will happen this summer
- Construction will take place this summer and next summer

Housing (Update provided by Laura Seyfang)

- Meadowview completion has been slowed down due to COVID
 - All units are sold
 - Project to be wrapped up in next 3 months
- BSCHT has partnered with Lone Mountain Land Company (LMLC) to develop deed-restricted rental units on Lone Mountain Trail corridor
- School teacher housing project:
 - 5 teachers have moved in
 - Phase 2 under construction now, ready for next school year
 - Great community support from construction companies
 - Always looking for volunteers
- Morningstar:
 - Looking to build housing for teachers on their property
- o Big Sky Resort:
 - Built 25 additional rooms for employees
- o LMLC:
 - Several projects in the works for more employee housing

• Parks, Trails, and Recreation (Update provided by Adam Johnson):

- New trails and pathways are in the works with the TIGER Grant and had success getting existing trails under easements to get trails into the BSCO network
- o BASE (community center) is on schedule
- o Ice Rink is open for the winter season and has been very popular this winter
- o Park attached to community center to open in July and host concerts if gatherings are allowed
- Purchased parcel adjacent to Community Park for future expansion
- o Grooming trails this winter is taking place and trail use has continued to be high

• Public Safety (Update provided by Greg Megaard):

- New patrol Sergeant Daniel Haydon and new Gallatin County Sheriff Dan Springer
- o Big Sky fire has been involved in the incident management and vaccine distribution in response to COVID-19
- Working with Gallatin County to improve radio systems in surrounding area
 - Project will start in the spring to build infrastructure, in place by late summer to early fall
- January 2021 had the highest call volume in history

• Education (Updated provided by Dustin Shipman):

- o \$23.5 million bond to expand facilities at school passed and a contractor has been selected
 - Work on an all-weather track and field will begin
 - Working on all day access to new P.E. facilities for the public
- o Board purchased a piece of adjacent property, still working on what to use the land for
- Back to 100% in person learning
- Looking for substitute teachers
- May Ballot:
 - 2 trustee positions (3-year terms)
 - \$75,000 operation levy for personnel services
- Mental Health Services:
 - Received a YCCF grant to raise awareness amongst grades 6-12 around mental health

Conservation (Update provided by Kristin Gardner):

- COVID-19 has increased pressure on water resources
- o GRTF working on updating strategic plan
- Looking for new and creative ways to fund large water management projects
- Several bills in legislative session that could be harmful to water resources, may reach out asking for support in opposing bills
- Wild & Scenic bill has been introduced for the Gallatin River

Healthcare (Updated provided by Taylor Rose):

- o Big Sky Medical Center has been very busy with vaccine distribution
- Resources and efforts being put towards behavioral health services being available in Big Sky

• Public Funding (Update provided by Daniel Bierschwale):

- Resort Tax is moving toward objective decision making using a scoring system
- o Resort Tax will be represented at the Joint County Commission meetings
- Interlocal agreements will be available for Government entities for FY22-24
- Helping with surveillance testing program and vaccines
- Tax Education brochure to help residents understand public funding coming soon

Arts & Culture (Update provided by Brian Hurlbut):

- o WMPAC has done a great job offering new and different programs to keep arts alive in the pandemic
- o Arts Council has offered online workshops and art auction is online and in person
- o 2 major public art installments in 2021
- Arts Council has hired an events coordinator
- Arts Council has taken over the Big Sky Artisan Festival and the event will move to Town Center
- o May need help working towards creative solutions to execute summer music and concert series

• Philanthropy (Update provided by Ciara Wolfe):

- YCCF working to secure financial resources and additional capacity for local non-profits
- YCCF has grown and working to fund more strategically
- o Big Sky Relief fund has had over \$2 million, and it has been a great resource for the community
- Hiring update:
 - YCCF has hired 2 new employees
 - SPCF is looking to hire their first Executive Director
- Great year for donations with more people spending more time in Big Sky
- Investing with partners for all aspects of mental and behavioral health
